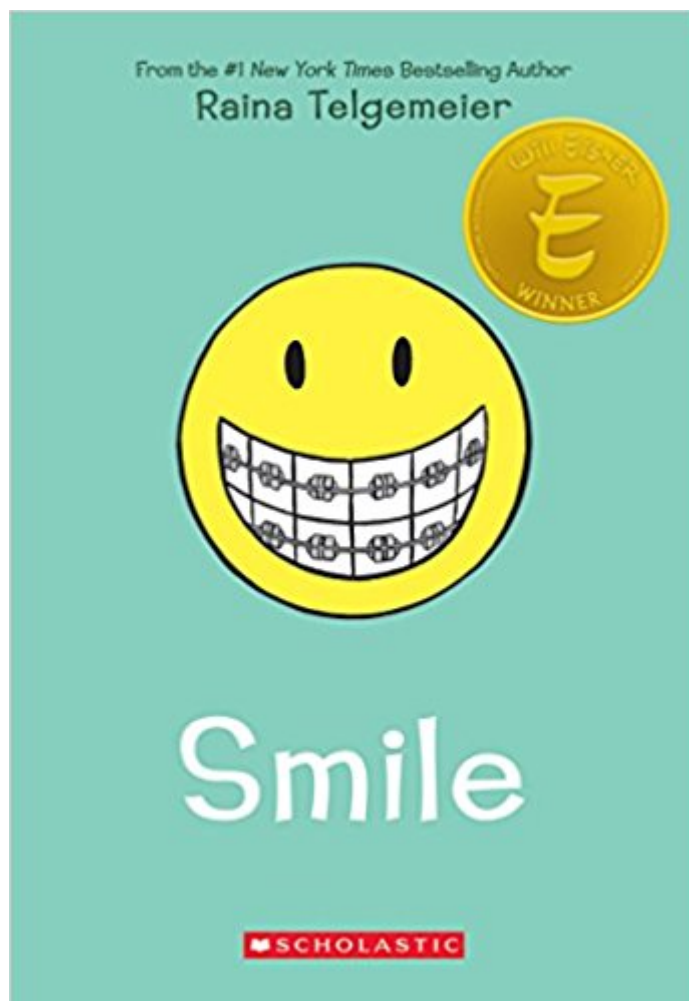

The dental case that Telgemeier documents in this graphic memoir was extreme: a random accident

led to front tooth loss when she was 12, and over the next several years, she suffered through surgery, implants, headgear, false teeth, and a rearrangement of her remaining incisors. Accompanying the physical treatment came social rough spots with friends, while puberty delivered another set of curveballs with crushes, maturing bodies, and changing family expectations and judgments. Both adults and kids—including various dental professionals and younger siblings—are vividly and rapidly portrayed, giving quick access to the memoirist's world. Telgemeier's storytelling and full-color cartoony images form a story that will cheer and inspire any middle-schooler dealing with orthodontia. At the same time, she shows how her early career choice as an animator took root during this difficult period—offering yet another gentle reminder that things have turned out fine for the author and can for her reader as well.

The school librarian put Smile on the summer reading list and I'm glad she did. The graphic novel format (like a comic book) was new to me but I liked it. The only problem was that if i was going to read this book out loud at bedtime both children wanted to see the pictures instead of laying down to listen. My 4th grader read this graphic novel on her own easier than a novel with only text.

I teach 2nd grade and this has been a popular book with my girls and boys. I read the book myself and can understand why so many of them enjoyed reading it and some actually went out and bought their own copy. Many students read it twice! The reasons why this is a five star book: It's funny! It is a true tale which motivates many students to appreciate the real twists and turns as the story develops. Raina (the main character) is likable and inspiring because she endures teasing from friends and has a tough painful cosmetic ordeal with braces, that luckily ends with a happy ending. If you are looking for a graphic novel to motivate young readers to get lost in a book, this is the one!

Smile is such a good book, it takes you on a journey through Raina Telgameir's life. I love the artwork and find that the comic book fomate makes the book much more interesting. Some people say that it's not appropriate for ages 8-12 because theres kissing and some girls that are mean and boyfriends, but i disagree.
