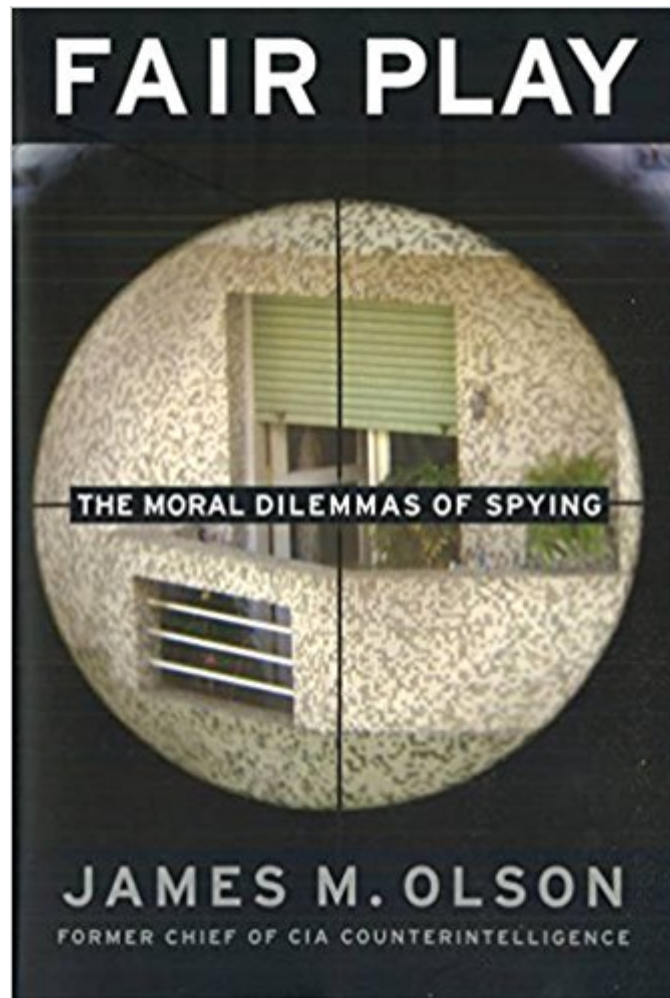


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Fair Play: The Moral Dilemmas Of Spying



Synopsis

Revolutionary War officer Nathan Hale, one of America's first spies, said, "Any kind of service necessary to the public good becomes honorable by being necessary." A statue of Hale stands outside CIA headquarters, and the agency often cites his statement as one of its guiding principles. But who decides what is necessary for the public good, and is it really true that any kind of service is permissible for the public good? These questions are at the heart of James M. Olson's book, *Fair Play: The Moral Dilemmas of Spying*. Olson, a veteran of the CIA's clandestine service, takes readers inside the real world of intelligence to describe the difficult dilemmas that field officers face on an almost daily basis. Far from being a dry theoretical treatise, this fascinating book uses actual intelligence operations to illustrate how murky their moral choices can be. Readers will be surprised to learn that the CIA provides very little guidance on what is, or is not, permissible. Rather than empowering field officers, the author has found that this lack of guidelines actually hampers operations. Olson believes that U.S. intelligence officers need clearer moral guidelines to make correct, quick decisions. Significantly, he believes these guidelines should come from the American public, not from closed-door meetings inside the intelligence community. *Fair Play* will encourage a broad public debate about the proper moral limits on U.S. intelligence activities.

Jim Olson is a true patriot. While I was hoping for cloak and dagger spy stories, this book is about what the title says - no subterfuge here. Having said that, I was bored as he wrestled with his theme citing philosophers, some long-gone and others fairly new, quoting their writings, and even scripture, on both sides of the dilemma. I personally side with those who say you gotta do what you gotta do and let the moralists agonize over it. In fairness I thought the scenarios he presented at the end were very good, thought provoking.

Professor Olson is the most engaging professor I have ever known through 13 years of collegiate level training. He is a passionate hero, an amazing story teller, and a gifted discussion leader. Those attributes blend well within his book as he tells the story through his eyes while blending viewpoints from others to create a fascinating text. A wonderful read for scholars, historians, and any student of government service.

Not only does it address interesting moral questions, but frankly its anecdotes offer a better overview of intelligence operations than ponderous tomes like Lowenthal's (especially for the time to read).

A more accurate description might be: "The ethical issues of getting what you want". It's not a quick read. There are a lot of thought provoking issues that may be better presented in a seminar as this seems to be how the book is written. We get the issue and then get a number of opinions on that issue summed up by the author. But in the reading; one is likely to develop their own opinion that doesn't square with any that are presented. It's a very "heavy" read.
