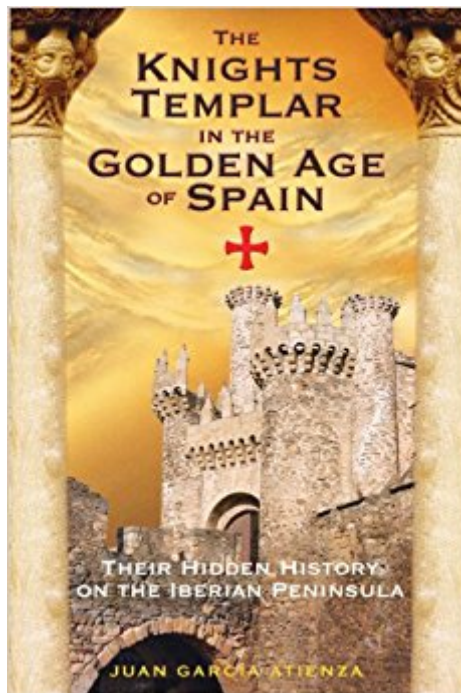




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The Knights Templar In The Golden Age Of Spain: Their Hidden History On The Iberian Peninsula

I really wanted to like this book. A serious study of the Templars in Spain is much-needed. But unfortunately this book is a disaster in every way possible. Rarely have I read anything this chaotic and rambling and lifeless. Of the dozens of people mentioned in this catastrophe of a book, not a single one is brought to life in any manner. The book has no semblance of a structure. It reads like a sloppy rough draft of rambling thoughts on the subject by a confused and overwhelmed author who has not the slightest clue of how to structure a book of history. This is a disgrace. Waste of money and time. Great cover, great subject matter but a uniquely horrible author to make a mockery of himself and the subject at hand. I read over 130 pages of this incoherent, rambling, scatter-brained book and then flung it across the room in sheer frustration. It should receive zero stars. This book is DREADFUL.

This is a very interesting account by an eminent author on this topic. However, the reader must be warned it is a confusing read if you are not in command of the historical time period of the mid-middle ages on the Iberian Peninsula. Besides this fact the reader needs to understand this text was originally written in Spanish and recently, 2006, translated into English which modifies the sentence structure and understanding. To enhance understanding the book requires more maps aside from the two in figures 4.1 and 5.2 and genealogy diagrams to explain places and peoples in this confusing period. Finally, some diagrams are without keys, see Fig 4.4. Suffice it to say I purchased this book to obtain information on Portuguese Templar history and I was rewarded midway through the text with more information than I bargained for. The book sketches the life of Gaudim Pais and the importance of the Tomar Region in Portugal during this period. I will be participating in the reenactment of the siege of the Tomar Castle of 1190 in which Pais deterred the Almohads at the "Bloody Gate" of the castle's south wall. For the reader interested in the Templar participation or lack thereof in the Cathar Heresy, the author spends much text on this topic which was very informative to me. It appears the Order did not concern itself with this heresy crusade against fellow Christians and continued their attention against the Saracens in the south. Juan Garcia Atienza constantly throughout the book invokes the phrase Synarchic ideals of the Iberian Templars referring to the broad universal religious vision not shared by the Roman Catholic Church. Midway through the text he spends a good deal on James I, a descendant of El Cid, and king of the Catalan-Aragonese and moves into the order created by him, Order of Mercy. From this point he describes the interesting history of the invasion of the Balearic Islands that took place by him explaining his statue prominently displayed in the center of

Palma de Mallorca. This book is full of material I have not been previously exposed to regarding the Knights Templar Iberian history. I very much enjoyed reading this book and recommend it to the student and scholar alike.

This was great and superbly researched, but man, it was dense with a thousand names of bishops and cardinals and abbeys and political intrigue.

I have read many books about the Knights Templar. Yet, I was surprised when I read this book about their history in Spain. Other books I have read focus on other countries with no mention of Spain. It expanded my knowledge of the Knights Templar, knowledge that had been repressed for centuries. To my surprise, I discovered links to some of my ancestors. I had suspected it for a while as some of my geneology research seemed to point to it. Very interesting. I give it 4 stars only because I have read others that are less tedious to read, but anyone truly interested in the Knights Templars needs to read it.

Templar lore is usually baloney. This is real history, closely reasoned and though speculative, it is credible. I wish I could read Spanish well enough to read the author's works in detail.
