


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# The Splendid Indian: The Pleasure Of Sailing On My Own Across The Indian Ocean From Australia To South Africa



## **Synopsis**

Peter Barker recounts the story of sailing solo across the Indian Ocean from Australia to South Africa. At the age of 53, put his career into the wardrobe along with his pinstriped suits and did what he always wanted to do - sail around the world on his own. In 2007, he discovered the challenge and vulnerability of solo sailing; knocking himself unconscious; having his boat knocked down twice in a storm; escaping disaster after almost being blown on to a reef and, at all times, testing his nerve to the limit. Peter savoured weeks of being alone in a big, blue sea. He lived a rigorous routine 24 hours a day, day after day. He encountered strong winds and big seas but still found humour in the simple challenges of cooking and eating. He sailed from Sydney to the Torres Strait where he was reunited with the man who taught him to understand the sea. Across the Indian Ocean he discovered new lands and people - Cocos (Keeling) Islands, small pieces of paradise, and Rodrigues Island, Mauritius and Reunion Island. I looked forward to reading about his future adventures on the promised 'around the world' voyage but can't find any other book by the author. This book is interesting as he tells his life story up to the voyage and gives good details about the process of finding and getting a boat ready for voyaging. His trip to South Africa is interesting and shows how he uses the modern technology that was installed on his boat. I was put off by the party atmosphere in each and every port and began to skip those portions, but if drinking, snacking, BBQs and other non sailing activities make your day, then you might want to read every word.

An enjoyable read but seemed to lack a real sense of "adventure". Maybe further development of some of the other sailors he met in his travels could have added to the narrative. Not meant to detract from his accomplishment as credit is clearly deserved...just seemed to lack the zing that would have you looking forward to a sequel.
